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In March 1775, residents of upper Germantown assembled to build a new school. With donations large and small, the building was completed by October. It was members of the *community* who amassed the energy and the funding to construct the Concord School House.

In 2012, it is still community that sustains us. Hundreds of visitors, of all ages, come and spend time with us. We are extremely grateful to the many **individual donors** who help us maintain our site and support our work.



This year, we have received two particularly generous grants. The **Knorr Family Foundation** has presented us with a gift of \$2500. Jacob Knorr was the builder of the Concord School House in 1775; he also founded a joiner's shop next door that later became the Kirk & Nice funeral home. Jacob Knorr and twenty-two Knorr family members lie at rest in the Upper Burying Ground. Thank you to the Knorr family for reconnecting with us and supporting our work!



For the sixth year in a row, we have received an operating grant from the **Philadelphia Cultural Fund**. This year's grant is for \$4134. This city program has been vital in sustaining the work of small sites like ours over the years, and we are grateful to the Mayor and City Council for continuing to fund the program.

Our sincere thanks also to the **Mt. Airy Business Improvement District** (Ken Weinstein, Chair), **The Northwest Fund** (Cindy Bass, Honorary Chair), and **John Siemiarowski** of Electrical Wizardry, Inc. for a grant and work to install new security lighting on the schoolhouse in 2011.

**Citibank** is sponsoring the celebrations held by multiple sites on Juneteenth, July 4, and October 6, the Revolutionary Germantown Festival. Our thanks to Historic Germantown for working with Citibank for this first-ever grant.

After the season's first opening on **Mount Airy Day**, the school and burying ground opened on **Memorial Day**, for the first year in recent memory. Memorial Day coincided in 2012 with the annual **Whit Monday** public Board meeting. Over forty visitors attended for guided tours and a bell-ringing.

**Juneteenth** enlivened the 6300 Block of Germantown Avenue with performances and activities. On **July 4**, our annual ceremony and bell-ringing will be followed at the Johnson House by 'Oney Judge,' reacting her life as one of George Washington's enslaved Africans and her escape to freedom.

On **August 18**, Concord again hosts "Back-to-school at the Old Schoolhouse": a charity event to donate school supplies to neighborhood children in need.



Also continuing through October are our **Second Saturday public openings**, noon-4pm.

## Kirk & Nice Celebrates 250 Years

2011 marked the 250th anniversary of the founding of the Kirk & Nice Funeral Home, considered the oldest funeral home in America. Jacob Knorr, the builder of Concord School House, established the business as a joiner's shop in 1761, on the corner of what is now Germantown Avenue and Washington Lane. Knorr is believed to have supplied coffins to bury those soldiers killed during the Battle of Germantown (October 4, 1777). Kirk and Nice, Inc. is now located in Plymouth Meeting.

To mark the occasion, Kirk & Nice produced a brief video documentary, partially filmed at our site and available on youtube. In addition, see Eva Brothers's useful article, "Preserving the Art of Preservation: Kirk and Nice at 250," in the Fall 2011 issue of *The Germantown Crier*, published by the Germantown Historical Society.

This photograph represents the Upper Burying Ground in a different era, 1895. It has hung for many years in the schoolhouse but was recently taken down and removed from its acidic mat and damaged frame, for preservation.

A local photographer named Lee Sowden may have taken the photo. It is one of the few pieces of evidence we have for the nineteenth-century appearance of the Upper Burying Ground.
